### **Good Manners**

It's always popular to bewail the deterioration of manners; there is an often quoted (and often disputed) story about Socrates' complaining that the young Athenians have 'bad manners, contempt for authority'. But the age-old parental job remains.

And that job is to start with a being who has no thought for the feelings of others, no code of behaviour beyond its own needs and comforts — and, guided by love and duty, to do your best to transform that being into what your grandmother might call a good person. Manners are at the heart of the whole parental enterprise.

Every infant is born adorable but selfish and the centre of the universe. It's a parent's job to teach that there are other people, and other people matter. A child's manners have a huge impact on people's lives. Do they look you in the eye? If you put your hand out do they shake it? Do they say hello? Do they grab what they want? Do they interrupt? Do they make daily life a pleasure?

Social skills like manners are necessary for school success: they affect how you do on the playground, in the classroom, in the workplace.

And of course, one of the long-term consequences of being a rude child is being a rude adult. We too often encounter a mature adult who still sees the world only in terms of their own wants and emotions: I want that so give it to me; I am angry so I need to hit out; I am in charge so shut up and do as I say.

Adults of course must respect a child's intellectual and emotional privacy: I'm not telling you to like your teacher; I'm telling you to treat her with courtesy. I'm not telling you that you can't hate Tommy; I'm telling you that you can't hit Tommy. Your feelings are your own private business; your behaviour is public.

But that first big lesson — that there are other people out there whose feelings must be considered — affects a child's most basic moral development. For a child, as for an adult, manners represent a strategy for getting along in life, but also a successful intellectual engagement with the business of being human.


