As Jesus went along, he saw a man who had been blind from birth. He spat on the ground, made a paste with the spittle, put this over the eyes of the blind man and said to him, 'Go and wash in the Pool of Siloam' (a name that means 'sent'). So the blind man went off and washed himself, and came away with his sight restored.

His neighbours and people who earlier had seen him begging said, 'Isn't this the man who used to sit and beg?' Some said, 'Yes, it is the same one.' Others said, 'No, he only looks like him.' The man himself said, 'I am the man.' They brought the man who had been blind to the Pharisees. It had been a sabbath day when Jesus made the paste and opened the man's eyes, so when the Pharisees asked him how he had come to see, he said, 'He put a paste on my eyes, and I washed, and I can see.' Then some of the Pharisees said, 'This man cannot be from God: he does not keep the sabbath.' Others said, 'How could a sinner produce signs like this?' And there was disagreement among them. So they spoke to the blind man again, 'What have you to say about him yourself, now that he has opened your eyes?' 'He is a prophet' replied the man.

'Are you trying to teach us,' they replied 'and you a sinner through and through, since you were born!' And they drove him away.

Jesus heard they had driven him away, and when he found him he said to him, 'Do you believe in the Son of Man?' 'Sir,' the man replied 'tell me who he is so that I may believe in him.' Jesus said, 'You are looking at him; he is speaking to you.' The man said, 'Lord, I believe', and worshipped him.

#### Dear Parish family,

Recently, after my annual visit to the optometrist, I have acquired a new pair of glasses. While I have used reading glasses for many years now, this is the first time that I have been prescribed "distance" glasses – and has it opened a whole new world?!

To be honest, I didn't see the need for these glasses, because as far as I was concerned my eyesight is pretty good. But once I tried them on everything is so much more clearer, colours are brighter and road signs are sharper!

I guess that the clearer vision I now experience is just a fraction of the light that came into the world of the man who was born blind in today's gospel. The world of darkness that he inhabited was certainly one of loneliness, incapability and of judgement. We see this in the question the disciples asked Jesus: "Rabbi, who sinned, this man or his parents, for him to have been born blind?" Just to acknowledge the man's existence was to acknowledge the presence of sin, or disorder, on the part of at least one of his parents or himself.

Jesus reaches out to the man, physically, in order to restore his sight and give him some dignity in the community in which he lived, and also that everyone may see that God gives light that dispels all darkness – including sin, guilt and shame – in his healing grace.

The blindness that shuts out this light is that of judgement and selfishness, which he warns the pharisees who question him that they are in danger of being overwhelmed by.

Let us pray in our Masses this weekend for this gift of light promised by God, that our lives, and particularly the lives of **Melissa Jago and Jackie Divall** who continue on their journey to sacramental initiation, may be enlightened by the risen Christ this Easter.


