From the Principal:

In the Seasons of the Church we are ending the period of Lent and about to enter the Season of Easter. The Passion of Christ, in the lead up to his death and then Resurrection, is the essential cornerstone of our faith as Catholics and Christians.

"...The word 'Passion' takes its roots from the Greek, pascho, to suffer. In the Latin translation of the scriptures (the Vulgate) the word passio specifically referred to Jesus' suffering, his agony in the garden, his trial, his being stripped of his clothes and whipped, his humiliating crowning with thorns, the bearing of his cross, his crucifixion.

Passion came to mean something for which we would suffer for or endure. A young singer desperate to sing for Opera Australia might plot and plan to achieve that goal, will endure poverty, disappointment and lowly roles in order that their passion may be satisfied. What is your real passion? What would you endure for your passion? Like you, I suspect, my passion is my family....." (Peter Douglas Head of Services North- Catholic Education Tasmania.)

The events of Holy Week have the whole spectrum of life's realities: betrayal, cruelty, ego, politics, injustice and doubt, kindness, disappointment and then most important of all, HOPE! The key message is of hope! Hope amongst cruelty, injustice and betrayal. Sadly for many, if not most of us, we have experienced disappointment, loss, cruelty and sadness. Yet it is hope that moves us onwards and upwards, hope that motivates to try again, hope that makes us believe things can turn around or improve.

Faith is tested and questioned when we see the death of innocent people in wars waged across the world? When we see disease, drought, starvation and poverty? God is present in the hope and kindness of people that fight for cures, for aid, that are the voice of those that are voiceless, for peace amongst the violence and bravery amongst the actions of cowards.

From the Principal:

In the newsletter there is some information around Overland Jack. The Duffy family along with other SHS Families including Rachel Williams, Damon Goody and Ivor Carins will walk the Overland Track (65km) from 14^{th} – 19^{th} April. Jack has cerebral palsy spastic quadriplegia. Later in the newsletter you can read more information about this. In part of the information they write:

" ...Jack's life and this adventure isn't about what he can't do, it's about how - with a little help from those around him - he can do just about anything. The sad thing is that Jack is one of the lucky ones. Those around him are healthy enough and able to support him in his adventures. Jack wants to raise money for other people who aren't so lucky and need help in breaking down their own real or perceived barriers."

This is the Easter Message right in front of us in 2015, living the same message of over 2000 years ago..... Hope!

HOLY WEEK


Holy means "set apart." Christians set apart an entire week - Holy Week - to recall the events surrounding the suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus.

As a current Kinder teacher, it is always a bit challenge as well as spiritual experience, to share what this time might mean to a four and five year old child. It is difficult to explain that a long time ago crowds of people enjoyed the company and teachings of a man called Jesus, yet the leaders of that time were threatened by Jesus' growing popularity and followers and wanted to him out of the picture. When explaining why those leaders would feel like that, I likened it to that some people preferred living in their own selfish, mean and dark world instead of living a new way of life which Jesus spoke about and lived – a life of love and light for others.

But the voices of goodness were overshadowed and the land was covered in darkness and Jesus' life was over. Was this really the end to the new life Jesus spoke about and lived! No. God promised goodness and light. And on the third day Jesus' body was resurrected. This truly was the new life that God had promised! Jesus' Spirit lived in the hearts of faithful. This was the new life - living through and in others! What happened during Holy Week was only way for this new life of love to come to complete fruition. This is why we remember Jesus' suffering during Holy Week. And this is why we celebrate with great joy Jesus' resurrection on Easter Sunday!

Back in Kinder, we do remember (simply) but we mostly celebrate. We celebrate new life – Jesus' new life and the new life of love and light in us!

Many of you know Jack and for those of you that don't we would love to take a second of your time to tell you about Jack and his next big adventure. Jack is 8 years old and suffers from cerebral palsy spastic quadriplegia. He can't walk, talk or eat on his own. Despite this, Jack is going to complete the 65km Overland Track, Tasmania from 14-19 April 2015. Jack will be riding on his Dads back over the 65km journey and will be supported by an amazing team of volunteers. There are 4 Sacred Heart families participating in the walk and there have been an even greater number that have helped out in the lead-up to the big event.

Jack completed Kinder at Sacred Heart back in 2011 and his older brother and sister still attend. We wanted to take this opportunity to thank the school community for the fantastic support they have shown Jack and our family over the course of our many adventures. Jack loves nothing better than picking his brother and sister up at school and being greeted by the many smiling faces that he sees.

Jack's life and this adventure isn't about what he can't do, it's about how - with a little help from those around him - he can do just about anything. The sad thing is that Jack is one of the lucky ones. Those around him are healthy enough and able to support him in his adventures. Jack wants to raise money for other people who aren't so lucky and need help in breaking down their own real or perceived barriers.
